
# Pizza Supper and Ash Wednesday Service

#### From the Pastor

How we understand the role of the pastor shapes how we relate to that person. We can't help but be affected by our past and our past relationships. As a child I didn't even use the word pastor; as a child of Catholic parents I only understood the terms "priest" and "Father." Certainly a priest is a pastor, though set aside in a different way than a Protestant minister. A Presbyterian minister is set aside for two distinct roles - to preach the Word and administer the Sacraments. Presbyterians enjoy our identity as the "priesthood of all believers" but the pastor has a distinct responsibility to study and teach the faith and equip the body of Christ for the work of ministry.

In the near future you will call a person to exercise a ministry of Word and Sacrament here in Orange. When you do, he or she will work primarily for the sake of the Gospel, in other words, as a servant of Christ; he or she will secondarily work for the presbytery, and, in a third sense for you - to support and equip you for *your* ministry. Likewise, pastors are accountable first to God, then to their presbyteries, and then to the congregations that call them.

This in-between time at OPC has allowed you to discern what is important for you as you take the next steps. The Mission Study Team has prepared the congregation well in exploring what is important. We have examined internal and external needs, and will use that information as a way to invite a good match. In the meantime, think about how your past

relationships with ministers impacts how you see the next relationship. Think about what you will do to foster a good relationship - what you will do to welcome and partner with



the person called to work at this place in these particular times.

Now that the Mission Study Report is complete we have invited our General Presbyter Carson Rhyne to lead worship on March 12, then meet with session members and the Mission Study Team after worship to consider next steps. His role is to lend insight about possibilities and to accompany you along the way as you make your own decisions.

Please mark your calendars for all Lenten activities at OPC. Our spiritual practice for Lent will be two-fold: rising and setting with prayer (get up in prayer and go to bed in prayer); and, using the six weeks of Lent to prepare for **rebirth**. God gave birth to this church in its original form on November 8, 1845 (serving Madison and Orange Counties) then birthed its formation at West Main and Caroline Streets in 1910. As we make our way to Easter, let us expect a rebirth, as we prepare for a new chapter, new ministries and new vision. The Resurrection forms the backdrop to our hope; Lent gives us space to prepare.

## **Session Meeting Highlights**

At its February meeting, the session, among other actions:

- Welcomed incoming ruling elders Joanna Davies and May Saxton onto Session.
- Thanked outgoing ruling elders Leslie Clements, Ellen Kendall, Al Packard, and Ted Sherwin for their dedication and service.
- Approved the scheduling of the annual Chili Cook
   Off in the Fellowship Hall be held on Sunday,
   March 19 after worship.
- Were informed by the Mission and Outreach Committee of two mission trip opportunities to Richwood, WV. The town was devastated by flash floods. April 1-8 there will be a mission trip for skilled workers. April 9-15 there will be a second trip for unskilled and semi-skilled workers. The cost of participation is \$200 per person. The Session approved the committee's recommendation for each church member who participates, this

cost will be covered with money from the Benevolence Fund.

- Were informed by the Personnel Committee that its name has been changed to the Covenant Review Team. This is part of the process of revising the traditional personnel review process to one that recognizes we're in a ministry of all believers.
- Approved a recommendation from the Worship and Music Committee that the church allow the Community Chorus to use the sanctuary April 22-23 or May 6-7 for a rehearsal and concert.

#### Bazaar, Bazaar, Bazaar

The Holiday Bazaar needs your help. We are looking for individuals or groups who would assume responsibility for various parts of the bazaar in the coming year. Find one of the areas listed below, consult a friend, and sign up together to use your expertise and enthusiasm to manage all aspects of this area in the coming year.



- KITCHEN Work with others in your group to handle the sale of soups during the two day bazaar event, locate others willing to make soup for the occasion, man the cafe during the two day event, make sure the kitchen is kept clean.
- SET UP Decide best format for setting up tables for sales, obtain additional tables as needed, determine what table covers should be used and arrange to have things packed away at the end of the bazaar.
- GIFT BASKETS Determine how to best obtain items for gift baskets, collect baskets to be ready on the day they are to be filled, arrange baskets and wrap in plastic wrap for sale.
- WHITE ELEPHANT Assist in collection of items throughout the year, arrange for pricing and placing on tables in preschool area, box up unsold items to be delivered to Goodwill. Coordinate with preschool staff the use of the preschool area during the bazaar.
- BAKERY Arrange for items to be donated for bakery table, wrap and arrange them as necessary, perhaps hold a cooking morning in the church kitchen with friends using favorite recipes to make items for sale.
- GREENERY Arrange to have items available on Thursday before the bazaar to make floral and greenery arrangements. Make sure containers and oasis are available.
- CRAFTS Hold workshops to make craft items and have the congregation donate craft items they have made. Try to collect items throughout the year.
- MARKETING Determine where to market the bazaar (signs, newspaper, newsletters, bulletins, etc.), prepare the advertisements and submit as appropriate, modify the street signs and hang them at the appropriate time.
- PRICING Each item needs to be priced when all items have been placed on sale tables. Some items may already be priced by the person donating the item.

### **Mission Trip - Your Opportunity to Serve**

Last summer horrific rains and devastating floods, comparable to a category 3 hurricane, devastated Richwood, West Virginia. This small struggling town is located in the valley of the mountains along the Cherry River. The heavy rains caused flash floods that poured water down the mountain and directly through the houses. The Cherry River flooded land, homes, and the only shopping center. Neither the middle school nor the high school could



reopen, and students have been sent elsewhere. If you could help, Richwood would appreciate having you.

The Presbytery Mission and Service Team is pleased to announce two mission trips to Richwood in April. Folks of all skill levels are needed to support our neighbors in nearby West Virginia where work is greatly needed to repair homes. The first trip is April 1-8. Brown Pearson, an elder at Southminster Presbyterian Church, will lead this group. He has led over 25 teams to the Gulf Coast and other locations. All skill levels are needed and welcomed.

The second trip is April 9-15, with a departure from Richmond on Sunday afternoon. The leader of this group is Ken Brammer, also an elder at Southminster. This trip is especially designed for unskilled and semiskilled workers, youth, and young adults.

The Presbytery is sharing in the costs, and the requested donation from the participants will be covered by the church as approved by Session. Sleeping arrangements are at Richwood Presbyterian Church. For more information, please contact Shirley Newman or a member of the Mission and Outreach Committee.
